







Marriage Location 1550-1770





Marriage age combinations: bachelor/spinster marriages 1701-1754










Figure 5.3 Marriage age combinations: bachelor/spinster marriages Source: tab. 5.5.




Female age at first marriage frequency distribution 1701-50




Male age at first marriage frequency distribution 1701-50
